### MAJOR DEVELOPMENTS IN ANCIENT INDIA

The teaching and learning process revolves around a well-structured and sequenced acquisition of knowledge and skills.

Teaching and learning under this program involves classroom lectures as well tutorials. The tutorials allow a closer interaction between the students and the teacher as each student gets individual attention. For a visual and better learning outcome, instructors will use ICT facilities, e-learning platforms and other innovative e-content platforms for student-centric learning methods. As part of participative teaching-learning practices few courses include seminars, presentations and group discussions. To cater the needs of slow and advance learners, special, remedial and peer teaching classes will be encouraged. Apart from these, exposure visits, special lectures by invited experts, workshops, and National/International seminars are to be held to augment knowledge, encourage innovative ideas and expose the students to global academic and research advancement. There is also the provision of mentor- mentee for each class where the mentor can keep track of each student's progress and address her/his individual difficulties. For the experiential learning course on project work is offered (i.e. short-term projects, research projects, assignments and field works), which is the integral components of the program that enable the students to solve practical problems. The provision of written assignments and projects submitted by students as part of the course, are also to be discussed in special classes. For each course students will be assigned regular home assignments and will be tested periodically through quizzes and class tests to ensure that they have properly learnt the course material.

Description of the event and its Significance/Scope in 100-200 words The programme started at 10:30 am with the welcome address by Hon'ble Vice-Chancellor Prof N. Nagaraju. Opening remarks and introduction of the programme was given by Dr. Rupashree Brahma Kumari. Resource Persons Dr. Raja Ram Dash, Gynaecogolist-Obstetrician, Sambalpur; Mr. Prem Ranjan Panda, Lawyer, Sambalpur and Dr. Puspashree nayak, District Project Manager, Odisha Livelihoods Mission, Department of Mission Shakti, Sambalpur were the dignitaries invited for the workshop. The resource persons were felicitated by the university for their significant contribution towards their role in creating awareness on women reproductive rights. Mrs. Jugeleswari Dash, Registrar, G.M.University congratulated the university for organizing this workshop for the students. Dr. U.C.Pati, Dy. Registrar, G.M.university advised the faculties of the university to participate in such programme for benefit of the students as well as for the society. Dr. Sushree Sasmita Pati welcomed all the dignitaries to the dais and introduced the resource persons to the audience. Total number of 350 participants including GMU faculty and students joined in the workshop.

Dr. Raja Ram Dash, highlighted the topic on menstrual cycle and female hygiene. Dr. Dash showed the students various pictures of female genitals to make students understand the basic knowledge about the female body. Dr. Dash also highlighted the essential care for female body and how to control PCOS, PCOD. Dr. Dash suggested the students to have more clarity on good quality food to intake everyday for maintaining a healthy body. A healthy body can help maintaining the female reproductive organs. Dr. Dash enlighted the audience with the description on medical care and facility provided by the government for the women reproductive organs.

Mr. Prem Ranjan Panda, provided a valuable knowledge on Article 21. Mr. Panda also cited many examples of reproductive rights which have been exercised in many cases in India. Since Mr. Panda has been associated to Sakhi Center of the Sambalpur, Odisha branch, he gave many examples related to reproductive rights exercised by women in case of Rape, forced marriages. Mr. Panda also advised students to avoid early marriage to avoid early pregnancy. Mr. Panda explained various questions asked by the students as well as the faculty members on the light of the exercise the reproductive rights of the women.


